Reflections on Readings for the Feast of the Presentation in the Temple

"The Child's Father And Mother Were Amazed At What Was Said About Him "

This Sunday is the Feast of the Presentation in the Temple. It occurs 40 days after the birth of Jesus (Dec. 25) and fulfilled the Mosaic Law of presenting



the newborn first male child to God in the temple. In a sense, this feast highlights the priesthood of Christ as it marks the significance of the Messiah's first entrance into the temple.

In our first reading (Malachi 3:1-4), the Prophet Malachi foretells the coming of John the Baptist, "Lo, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me as well as the time when the Messiah himself will enter the temple, and suddenly there will come to the temple the Lord whom you desire. Yes, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts." Malachi also warned that this would be a time of judgement and purification of liturgical abuses. This was indeed seen as Jesus overturned the tables of the money changers in the temple and criticized their lack of proper respect for the Father's house.

In our Epistle reading (<u>Hebrews 2:14-18</u>), we learn that, in order to "explate the sins of the people", Jesus shared in our blood and flesh that "he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the Devil." Jesus "had to become like his brothers and sisters in every way that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest before God".

In our Gospel reading (Luke 2:22-40), we hear the story of Mary and Joseph's presentation of Jesus to God in the temple, as the Law of Moses had required of them. They offered for sacrifice a pair of turtle doves because they were too poor to afford the prescribed year-old lamb. During this ceremony, we hear the beautiful canticle of Simeon, as he recognized the baby Jesus as the "Christ of the Lord, the long-awaited Messiah, "...and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to Him, Simeon took Him into his arms and blessed God, saying: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples...." We also hear of the prophetess Anna, "And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem."

Celebrating the 4th Anniversary of our Racial Justice Ministry

Four years ago, St. Rita Parish embarked on a new venture with our Racial Justice Ministry (RJM). It was sparked by the Catholic Church's mission to embody the Gospel's call to love and serve all people, promoting the dignity of every individual. The Church teaches that all humans are created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27), which compels us to confront systemic injustices that undermine this truth.

In an increasingly divided world, our Racial Justice Ministry has provided a prophetic voice, advocating for equity and understanding among all people. The RJM team has engaged in a variety of education, awareness, advocacy, and outreach programs, helping our community recognize the realities of racism and its impact on marginalized groups. Our desire is that, by fostering dialogue and understanding, this ministry can promote much needed healing and reconciliation, aligning with Christ's mission of love.

This year promises to bring even more exciting opportunities to engage in God's work! With continued collaboration with Immaculate Conception Parish and the Rochester Black Catholic Coalition, continued education through the "Blessed Among Us" biographies posted on the entrance to the church, guest speakers, witness talks and prayerful gatherings, our desire is that St. Rita Parish will continue to cultivate an environment where all voices are heard and valued.

If this has ignited a flame within you, we would ask that you prayerfully consider joining us at one of our monthly meetings, the <u>second Tuesday of the month at 6:30pm</u> <u>in Room 1.</u>

Lastly, the Racial Justice Ministry, and other ministries (i.e. Holy Beginnings LGBTQ+ Outreach, Homeless Ministry, Refugee Services) are essential for nurturing a faith community that reflects the love of Christ and advocates for the marginalized. It is how we live our parish mission statement:

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Howard Thurman

Howard Washington Thurman (1899 – 1981) was an African American author, philosopher, theologian, Christian mystic, educator, and civil rights leader. He was born into an all-black community in Daytona Beach, Florida and was raised by his grandmother Nancy, who as a young woman, was a slave during the Civil War. Thurman studied for ministry at the Rochester NY Theological Seminary from 1923 – 1927.

Howard Thurman was known for his profound influence on the Civil Rights movement through his philosophy of nonviolence and deep spirituality, particularly on figures like Martin Luther King Jr. Thurman's most impactful work was "Jesus and the Disinherited," which examined Jesus' teachings through the lens of the marginalized, highlighting the relevance of his message to Black Americans. As a dean at Howard University and Boston University, he promoted interracial dialogue and co-founded one of the first interracial churches in the United States. Thurman's life and teachings emphasized the importance of inner peace, community building, and seeking "common ground" across racial divides.








St. Rita School Where Faith and Knowledge Meet! God Drop Corner
